Council Meeting Highlights

- Council has approved the contracting of Everline Coatings (Ltd) to professionally paint and complete the renovation of our outdoor recreational courts.
- Council has also approved the installation of signage indicating that no vehicles are to enter the recreational space, or the immediate surrounding area
- Council has approved the removal of old signage along the public walking trails
- Weed removal has additionally been approved. As such, a notice will be issued temporarily closing the path to ensure thorough removal.
- The area effected by water line maintenance on Second ST has been infilled, and barriers removed per the direction of council.
- Minor road maintenance near Marwayne Jubilee School was also completed by publics works
- Following this summer's water infrastructure repairs, in step with measures taken by public works
 to increase monitoring, we have decreased water loss by leakage to nearly zero litres/minute of
 overnight loss.

Voices from Alberta Councils



I ran because I saw opportunities to build a better future for our community. My background in small business gave me useful skills, but what really mattered was simply caring about my town and wanting to be part of its arowth. — Alberta councillor, small municipality

The most rewarding aspect of serving on council is seeing projects come to fruition that improve residents' quality of life. When you help solve a long-standing problem or bring a new amenity to your community, the sense of accomplishment is incredible. — Alberta councillor, rural municipality

What Municipal Councillors Do

Municipal councils are responsible for:

- Setting the direction and future vision for your community
- Establishing policies and bylaws to set the quality and level of local services
- · Approving annual budgets and determining tax rates
- Making land use, zoning, and development decisions
- Providing oversight of the municipality through the Chief Administrative Officer (CAO)
- Engaging with the community to understand their needs and concerns

Typical Monthly Duties

- 2-3 Council meetings per month
- Committee meetings (hours dependent on the community)
- Reading reports and preparing for meetings (6-10 hours per month)
- Public events and resident interactions
- · Email and phone correspondence with constituents

 * The workload often increases during budget season and important public hearings.

Understanding Local Jurisdiction

One of the most important aspects of municipal governance is understanding what falls within local jurisdiction:

Within municipal authority:

- Local roads and transportation
- · Water, wastewater, and waste management
- · Parks, recreation, and community facilities
- · Fire services, peace officers, and bylaw enforcement
- · Land use planning and development permits
- Property taxation
- · Local economic development

Outside municipal authority:

- Healthcare system and hospitals (Provincial)
- · Education and school curriculums (Provincial)
- · Highways (Provincial)
- Social services (Provincial/Federal, with municipal partnerships)
- · Criminal code and justice system (Federal)
- · Income tax and GST (Federal)

Working effectively within your jurisdiction means focusing on what you can control while advocating for your community's interests with other levels of government when needed.

2025 Municipal Election

Working With Administration

Council sets policies, and municipal administration implements them. Understanding this relationship is crucial:

- Council works as a collective body (individual councillors have no direct authority)
- The CAO is Council's only employee
- . Staff report to the CAO, not to individual councillors
- Respecting administrative expertise improves governance outcomes

Common Misconceptions vs. Reality

- x Councillors run day-to-day operations
- ✓ Council provides direction; staff handles operations
- x You need specific qualifications
- Your willingness to learn and a commitment to serve all members of your community matters most
- x Being a councillor is a full-time job
- For most councillors outside of large cities, it's a part-time role you can balance with other commitments
- x You'll make decisions alone
- ✓ Council decisions require a majority vote
- x You should know everything going in
- ✓ You'll learn through orientation and experience

Practical Skills That Help

While there are no formal qualifications required to serve on municipal Council, the following skills will help you to be an effective councillor:

- · Strong communication and listening abilities
- Ability to understand budgets and financial documents (training provided)
- · Critical thinking and problem-solving skills
- Ability to work collaboratively with diverse perspectives
- · Time management and organizational skills

Challenges and Rewards

Challenges you might face:

- Balancing diverse community interests, dealing with public scrutiny
- · Managing time between various commitments
- · Learning municipal processes and legislation

Rewards you'll experience:

- Making real improvements in your community
- Building meaningful relationships
- Being part of critical decisions creating a legacy for future generations

Do you Have Personal Property Stored on Municipal Owned Land?

If you have property stored on municipal owned land, you are required to fill out a Personal Property


Storage Form <u>every year</u>, as per Policy—AD 20

The Village of Marwayne staff will be checking all properties stored on Municipal owned land ensuring the proper paperwork has been filled out. Any personal property that fails to hand in the proper paperwork to the village either in person or by email

(admin@marwayne.ca) by **September 30, 2025** will be towed.

A few things to note when storing personal property on municipal owned lands:

- All personal property must be insured by the owner prior to being stored
- All personal property stored on municipal owned lands stored at the owners own risk
- Proof of residence must be provided to the Village administration office during application process to ensure eligibility
- Approval from the Village is required prior to placement of any personal owned property

A Pastor's Gleanings

Our 2025 Vacation Bible School at Bethel Lutheran Church is in the books! We had 36 enthusiastic students aged 4 to about 14. We had 13 great, capable teenaged helpers---one of whom stepped up to the position of class teacher! We had wonderful parent volunteers who looked after snacks for everyone.

Our theme this year was "Camp Chaos". Chaos has been described as "utter confusion and disorder". Does that sound like life?

"Where did I put those keys for the motorhome?" We were down to I set because about 10 years ago I dropped one set down into the sewer dump when I was dumping the tanks. We'd managed with I set of keys... but where are they? Chaos.

How about the 18 year old grandchild who hasn't attended school for the last 2 years and seems to be content coasting along playing video games... sometimes talking about getting a job... keeping strange hours. Chaos.

What about your work schedule? Is there actually a "schedule" (meaning: time for work, and time for rest), or do you just go from one thing that "needs to get done" to another thing that "needs to get done"? Are your relationships with those you love suffering because of it? Chaos.

We all experience chaos---sickness---the death of someone we love---problems in our relationships. The question is: "When the chaos gets inside of us, what do we do about it?" At VBS we learned that Jesus is our firm foundation in times of chaos. Jesus says, "Come to me, all who labor and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and you will find rest for your souls. For my yoke is easy, and my burden is light" (Matthew II:28-30).

Give your chaos to Jesus. When he enters your heart he puts the chaos outside. Jesus is not overwhelmed by the chaos... He is above it.

RESPECTING A LOVED ONE'S WISHES

Respecting a loved one's wishes after they have died is a deeply personal and often emotional responsibility. It is an act of love, remembrance, and integrity. Here are some ways you may approach respecting their wishes:

Understand and Clarify Your Loved One's Wishes: You can start by reviewing any documents (e.g. wills, advance directives, etc.). It can also be helpful to reflect on any conversations you may have had. When the loss of your loved one has been anticipated, this can sometimes influence the number of conversations you have had regarding their wishes. In other situations when the loss is unexpected, it can make it more difficult to navigate this process. It can be helpful to connect with family members and close friends who may have also had conversations with your loved one.

Carry Out Practical Matters Respectfully: Once you seek to understand your loved one's wishes, it may be time to carry out their preferences by honouring their specific requests, such as a location for a funeral/celebration of life and burial/cremation preferences. You can also consider whether there is a type of service or no service in their wishes and whether there are any religious customs to implement. Other practical matters include handling the estate and any legal and ethical steps that align with these matters that are outlined in your loved one's will or trust. In the current age of technology presence, you may also have to consider how to respectfully deal with your loved one's digital presence including creating a plan for how to handle their social media accounts (e.g. how to get access to the account, deleting accounts, etc.).

Navigate Conflicts with Grace: There may be conflicts that arise during the grieving process and not everyone may agree on how to interpret the deceased's wishes. Consider your role in this process and try to take an approach that seeks out clarity while being compassionate. Try to keep communication open with others who have played a significant role in your loved one's life. When things become difficult, use the reminder that the overall goal is to honour your loved one.

Reflect on What It Means to You to Honour Your Loved One: Respecting your loved one's wishes may allow you to feel at peace. However, this can also be difficult if it does not provide you with feelings of resolution that you may seek in your grieving process. Give yourself permission to grieve your own way, even while carrying out their desires. Connect with your main support network, seek out therapy support, engage in journalling, or allow yourself to step back as needed. You can respect your loved one's wishes by also respecting your boundaries and how these may change as you navigate your grief.

It can take time to feel like you have respected your loved one's wishes. Ongoing reflection is an expected part of the grieving process, and will hopefully aid in your process of feeling like you have done your best to honour their wishes.

Where did you grow up?

6 miles west of Marwayne.

When and how did you find yourself living in Marwayne?

Kay & I decided that after acquiring our trades in Edmonton, that Marwayne was a better place to raise a family.

What did Fire/Rescue look like prior to you getting involved?

At that time the Fire Department was all that existed, there were only 4 members. There were few organized meetings & these were held in the town shop. All we had for equipment was war surplus supplies & an old small fire truck that sometimes didn't run.

What were some of the highlights of learning about Fire/Rescue and getting it started?

The Village sent me to a Rescue Leadership course in Edmonton in 1990. The training was extremely interesting, working with search & rescue dogs, working with STARS as well as high angle rescue. At completion of my training the Village was given \$10,000.00 worth of rescue equipment. We as a department decided there was a real need for a Rescue Department in Marwayne and area. Because we had no rural equipment we fund raised & with the help of the Village we purchased a van that was modified mainly by Keith Parker to accommodate personnel & equipment needed for fires & rescues. It should be noted that we were the first First Responders in rural Alberta.

Is there a funny story of any situation with training/village council/fixing jobs? Something crazy you and Kay have been asked to fix/build?

We attended a fire at Swanson's slaughterhouse. All members were piled on the fire truck, inside and outside, Herb Ure was driving. Because the truck was seldom used, apparently the brake fluid leaked out. Upon arriving at the slaughterhouse we failed to stop and drove straight through a fence and a bunch of trees. No one was hurt and the fire was put out.

Probably the neatest job we have had was working on Ken & Sandra Kneen's Timber King log house. Whenever a project came up that we weren't sure if we could do it, Ken would tell us "How do you know you can't do it if you've never tried it". This led to a lot of extremely interesting work.

Service on Town Council - why did you join and what were some highlights from this experience?

I served as a Counselor for 6 years and 1 year as Deputy Mayor. I was told by Doc Cooke that if you're not willing to be part of the change, don't complain. Good advice! What I learned being on Town Council is to be very careful about setting a precedent, it could come back to bite you. I was also on the School Board, Arena Board, Minor Ball, FCSS Board member and the Pioneer and Valley Lodge Boards.

Advice for anyone thinking of being part of the fire & rescue and/or the village council?

These are two very different organizations. The Fire & Rescue Department is one of the very few volunteer organizations that actually save lives. It is a very worthwhile cause; the training you receive helps not only in the department but in your day-to-day life as well.

Village Council helps you to understand the workings of Municipal affairs, and there is more to the village than your little corner. I would encourage everyone to be on Town Council for at least one term - it's an eye opener.

You and Kay are well known as the go to "handymen" in Marwayne. What's the secret to working alongside each other so well? Not many husband/wife combinations could do what you two do!

Some days are good, some not. The most important aspect is to respect each other's abilities and opinions. Leave work at work.

As a senior in Marwayne are there any activities or events you would like to see happening within the village?

A huge Thank you goes out to the seniors that are currently running the Seniors Centre, it is enjoyed by all. I would enjoy it more if I could hear better. I am excited to learn Pickleball and with the new courts we hope to put them to use.

What do you hope for Marwayne's future?

I would love to see Marwayne continue to grow & thrive and to see more young people becoming involved within the village.

What is something we see in the village everyday (aside from fire & rescue) that you were a part of that most people don't know about?

The basketball court, now the Pickleball court was initiated by myself and Brian Youk. I was also fortunate enough to coach basketball the year my son and three other players attended Provincials (all 4 players were the sons of a team that I went to Provincials with years before.)

Any other tidbits/advice or thoughts you would like to leave us with? And who would you like to nominate for the next "Marwayne Moment"?

We should all be very proud of our little Village and all it has to offer. I would like to nominate Cindy Lennon for the next interview.
