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Council Meeting Highlights

- Council was pleased to have Jamie Day join council to discuss her role as school meal coordinator at MJS. Council was informed on distribution schedules, advertising opportunities, and donation collection, which was taken as information.
- Council discussed the implementation of additional signage on back alleyways on high traffic corridors near the walking trail, to remind both pedestrians and motorists of speed and awareness while utilizing these spaces.
- General updates on the status of the Subdivision development project.

Atco and TELUS contracts have been signed to install communication and utility lines to the developing property, with both scheduled installs occurring in 2025.

• Outdoor Recreation Facility has lines being painted from September 30th-October 3rd, with fence repairs occurring shortly following the completion of the painting.

Many areas along the walking trails are private property. Trail users must ensure they are cleaning up after their pet as well as keeping them off of adjacent properties.

Dog poop bags and trash cans are available at various spots along the trails for your convenience.



Do you Have Personal Property Stored on Municipal Owned Land?

If you have property stored on municipal owned land, you are required to fill out a Personal Property

Storage Form **every year**, as per Policy—AD 20

The Village of Marwayne staff will be checking all properties stored on Municipal owned land ensuring the proper paperwork has been filled out. Any personal property that fails to hand in the proper paperwork to the village either in person or by email

(admin@marwayne.ca) by **October 31, 2025 (**extended) will be towed.

A few things to note when storing personal property on municipal owned lands:

- All personal property must be insured by the owner prior to being stored
- All personal property stored on municipal owned lands is stored at the owners own risk
- Proof of residence must be provided to the Village administration office during application process to ensure eligibility
- Approval from the Village is required prior to placement of any personal owned property



PREGNANCY AND INFANT LOSS

October 15th is National Pregnancy and Infant Loss Awareness Day. It provides an opportunity to recognize the complex grieving experiences and to acknowledge and support individuals and families affected by pregnancy loss and infant death, including but not limited to miscarriage, stillbirth, SIDS, and ectopic pregnancy.

The purpose of setting aside this day is to remember lives lost. This includes babies who died too early in pregnancy or infancy while recognizing that their existence was important to individuals and families. It designates a day to be aware of support needed for grieving families with navigating the unique experience of losing a pregnancy or an infant. This type of grief is often hidden and not acknowledged widely by society. Therefore, designating October 15th to remembrance helps to break the silence and open up conversations about the significance of these losses.

To understand how to best support someone navigating pregnancy and infant loss, it is important to recognize that these types of losses can be traumatic experiences for individuals and families. Learning about trauma-informed support can empower individuals to support friends, family members, or others who are navigating this type of grief. Many who experience pregnancy and infant loss might end up experiencing isolation, anxiety, depression, guilt, shame, etc. Noticing when a loved one might be having a hard time and encouraging seeking help through support groups or individual therapy can help provide gentle acknowledgement of how difficult this type of loss can be.

Some additional ways to support loved ones navigating pregnancy and infant loss include:

Being mindful of the language you use: Avoid clichéd statements, such as, "everything happens for a reason" or "it wasn't meant to be." Replace these statements with empathetic statements, such as, "I'm thinking about you and your baby" or "I'm hear to listen."

Offer practical support: Consider bringing food, driving them to appointments, or making note of special dates for remembrance.

Honour the baby: Use the baby's name if your loved one has shared it. You may also consider sending a card or small memorial gift or participating in walks/runs in memory of their baby.

An additional thing you can do to support those navigating pregnancy and infant loss is to light a candle in remembrance on October 15th. There is something special about light. It can help us see past darkness and can give hope in that darkness that there is a future



Where did you grow up?

I grew up in Marwayne. I am the oldest daughter of Herb & Marilyn Ure, my sisters are Shelly, Lori and Lana.

When and how did you find yourself living in Marwayne?

Born and raised here, married the boy next door, Jim Lennon, and this is where I wanted to stay to raise my family. We were married in 1980, celebrating our 45th anniversary this year. We raised three children – Krista is living with us and her little dog Minnie; Andy is married to Kayla and have two girls Rayha & Hadley; Alicia married Monty Haines and they live in Edmonton.

When did you start working at TD Bank and how long did you work there for?

I started working at the TD Bank in April 1979 and worked there until April 2016. I was in Grade 12 but technically hadn't graduated. I was hired as a Bank Teller when every transaction was handwritten. So, your penmanship had to be very neat. So when computers came to the bank that was a huge learning curve. I came to work on a Monday after playing softball wearing a cast & crutches. So my job had to change, I was put on the posting machine where I memorized account numbers and recognized signatures. Many customers appreciated my memory when customers when to another branch they were asked for their account number and they would say "call Marwayne and ask for Cindy, she will know". Of course this was before debit cards. H

Over the years I have worked with many great people. I have missed my customers, but when living in a small town you get to se them. When the Branch closed in 2016 I was upset but maybe this was a chance to try something new.

Any crazy or funny stories from your time at the bank?

A funny story later but not at the time. A motorcycle had parked in front of the Bank. He was wearing a helmet. He walked into the bank still wearing the helmet. Well, I stepped back from my tellers wicket with my heart to my throat. Trying to remember what to do in a robbery. But he realized that the tension had increased. Especially the look of fear on our faces, so he took off his helmet and apologized, and it was someone we all knew.

When did you start playing ball and how did it become a significant part of your life?

Started playing ball at a very young age. When you could walk and hold a ball and glove you are ready to play. My Dad, Herb, was a ball player so I was going to play too. So, when my sisters came along, we were taught the basics. Dad was our coach for many years. I'm sure many girls remember those years. When we would practice at home in the yard the ball would go into the neighbor's garden, never got the balls back. Our first team was called the Rockets. The jerseys were home made by Moms in the Home-Ec Room at the school. They were red and white; I still have my coat.

We played in the summer games in Red Deer, a few provincials bringing home a few medals. When we played in tournaments we played against women. Most times winning.

At one time all four of the Ure girls played on the same team – so much fun! I also played with the Marwayne Marauders. I was 14, I was a catcher mostly but tried all positions. Being small but mighty the other team thought my throwing was weak. Boy were they wrong. Haha! They only tried a few times. My game for batting was my speed so bunting was my game.

My last game I played with the Marauders was in 2010. We were hosting Ladies Provincials. So proud of myself at 47 years to still be playing. This was a year after my breast cancer diagnosis. I played three innings, and I caught. Also won provincials. When playing a team sport, you know how to win and lose gracefully. Good sportsmanship. That was taught to all of us at a young age. So, this was taught to my kids. Also going down to my grandchildren.

Tell us about your involvement with Minor Ball?

My involvement with Minor Ball has been a long one. As soon as you step onto the diamond you are involved. If you're a player, coach, or parent you're involved. Now as grandparents just as much.

When your kids are in a sport get them to help with upkeep of the diamonds. Rake leaves, pick up garbage. Be proud of your community and facilities.

Minor Ball has hosted many tournaments and provincials over the years. This year we were asked fi we would look after the diamonds, so we said Yes. Then we found out Minor Ball was hosting U-17 Girls Provincials in July. Then the work began. Painting dugouts, bleachers, picnic tables, and the booth. The diamonds needed the most work. Soooo many weeds. Whipper snipping around fencing. With the help of parents and volunteers the diamonds were perfect. So many compliments from the teams that come to play. Thanks Marwayne for making our town proud.

You played ball in Australia! What team was that with and how did it come to happen? Australia – a trip of a lifetime. The team was Bonnyville Silverline a Masters team of women over the age of 40. We went to Melbourne, Australia in October of 2002 for nearly 2 weeks. We were playing for Canada. This was the Worlds Master Games of many different sports and age groups. It was a long flight of 17 hours especially since this was my first flight ever. The opening ceremonies was in the Melbourne Cricket Stadium. There were 95 countries attending and over 24,000 athletes. I was so overwhelmed with so many people and that I was in Australia. We won 6 out of 7 games securing a spot in the medal round. The seventh game was against Victoria, BC which ended in a tie. We then lost 2-1 to a US team putting us in the bronze medal game. Unfortunately, we lost that game but came home as winners.

We also made time to do some sightseeing. Went to a zoo where we saw kangaroos and I touched a joey inside the pouch, OMG. Saw a koala, Tasmanian devil – nothing like the cartoon. Went to Phillip Island to see the smallest penguins come to shore at sunset to their burrows.

Then there's the driving, on the wrong side of the road as is the steering wheel. Had to really watch crossing the street. It was so much fun looking through my backpack full of souvenirs to tell you about my wonderful experience.

Are there any boards or councils you have served on?

I have not been on any boards or councils. But if anyone needed help my family was there to volunteer.

Are there any events, activities or specific improvements you would like to see in the community? So excited to see the new playground equipment coming and the ongoing improvement of the arena. The hall at the ball diamonds needs to have a facelift so it can be used for many more generations.

What do you hope for Marwayne's future? What are some of your favorite things about Marwayne? Marwayne's future is looking very promising. The residents of Marwayne are proud, hardworking and want the village to succeed. My favorite things about Marwayne are the people. They will help you when any emergency happens to your family. Everyone will watch your kids as if they were their own. We support small businesses.
